I've Applied—Now What?

Applying is one of the first steps on your path to attending college. Keep in mind that it may take a couple of months for the college or university to get back to you. Here's a step-by-step guide for what to do in the mean-time:

Tip 1: Complete the FAFSA

We still see that a number of seniors who need to complete their FAFSA. You may not receive your financial package from many colleges until this is completed. Attend a <u>Virtual FAFSA Lab</u> or see the Career Center for Assistance.

Tip 2: Check your applied colleges emails/portal at least once a week.

It is important that you stay on top of your college application process. Most colleges have their own portal that you will have to log into and check your emails. This is extremely important in case they request additional information from you. You should make a point to check your prospective college emails at least once a week. You do not want to miss important deadlines or additional opportunities that the college is sending your way.

Tip 3: Apply to the specific colleges additional scholarship opportunities

Colleges have additional scholarships that they only offer to prospective students. Private Donors interested in investing in future students education offer scholarship opportunities. Tip 4: Communicate with colleges once you hear from them.

If you get accepted to a college, Congratulations! Remember, you have until May 1 to make most college decisions, so take your time weighing all of your options. If you decide you want to accept an offer, don't forget to send in all the forms your college will need: AP exam scores, housing deposits, etc. You will then need to register as a new student and enroll in classes. If you get waitlisted, send in your waitlist confirmation card. Contact the college to let them know they are still on your radar. Sometimes, the chances of getting in are slim, so review the colleges that accepted your application and come up with a second choice that you are happy with. Wait until May 1 to make a final decision.
