






What is the ACT?

- National standardized test required by most colleges and universities
- Usually taken in the spring of Junior Year
- Comprised of five subtests: English, Math, Reading, Science and Writing

 Assesses your potential to succeed in a college setting.















Two Keys for College Admission and Scholarships:



The ACT is a nationally-recognized test that assesses a student's likelihood of succeeding in college-level courses. If you intend to go to a college or university, the ACT may be the most important test you will take as a high school student.

Students who perform well on the ACT are more likely to be admitted into selective universities and more likely to receive significant scholarship money in Arizona and nationwide.

Arizona University Admission Requirements



Course competency requirements

To be admitted to ASU, you need the following coursework:

- · 4 years math
- 4 years English (non-ESL/ELL courses)
- 3 years lab sciences (1 year each from biology, chemistry, earth science, integrated sciences or physics)
- 2 years social sciences (including 1 year American history)
- · 2 years same second language
- 1 year fine arts or 1 year career and technical education

To be admitted, you will need ONE of the following:

- Top 25% in your high school graduating class
 OR
- 3.0 GPA in competency courses OR
- ACT score of 22 or higher (24 for nonresidents)
 OR
- SAT score of 1120 or higher (1180 for nonresidents)

Why is the ACT Important?



TEST OUT

- POSSIBLY Test out of College Courses!
 - Many universities use the ACT scores to determine which classes students should be placed in.

OVERCOME A LOW G.P.A.

- A High ACT score can help offset a lower GPA.
 - A lower GPA can be problematic when applying for different programs and scholarships. The sliding scale will help with this process.


While College-Going Rates are Declining...

Historically, Coyotes Attend College 54% of Coyotes graduating in the Class of 2024 enrolled in college right after high school.

 College degrees can have significant impacts on a number of life outcomes, including earnings:


 Many others start college later. As of last year, 72% of the Class of 2018 had gone to college.


Earnings and unemployment rates by educational attainment, 2023

American Community Survey (ACS), 2009–2019. Note: The figure is based on data for 25- to 64-year-olds working full-time, full-year.


It's a FACT that...

- Many universities require that you demonstrate certain ACT or SAT scores in order to gain admission
- Our district offers the \$90.00 ACT for free, thanks to a state grant.

- The ACT will be administered at Centennial on the morning of Tuesday, April 1st, 2025
- It's a challenging 3 hour, 30 minute test
- "Students benefit from taking at least one fulllength, timed practice ACT test so they become familiar with the content and pacing of the exam."

The Most Important Test We Take at CeHS


- Measures both knowledge gained in high school and potential to succeed in a college setting. The higher the score, the more likely a student will excel in college.
- •There are more college opportunities (money and college admission) attached to ACT than any other assessment.
- Relatively small improvements in ACT can result in significant monetary gains.

All juniors will take the ACT on Tuesday, April 14. The ACT is a nationally-recognized test that assesses a student's likelihood of succeeding in college-level courses. If you intend to go to a college or university, the ACT may be the most important test you will take as a high school student.

Students who perform well on the ACT are more likely to be admitted into selective universities and more likely to receive significant scholarship money in Arizona and nationwide. While students typically choose whether to pay \$90 to take the ACT, the Peoria Unified School District and Centennial High School require all juniors to take the ACT. Fortunately, there will be no cost. The ACT is free for you!

Today, you'll receive a booklet called "Preparing for the ACT Test." It features a full-length practice test, strategies for success, and information about what to expect on Tuesday. April 1st, the day of the test. We care about your success because we know your ACT test results matter to colleges and universities nationwide. Therefore, we have arranged for opportunities to help you understand the importance of the ACT and to prepare to do your best!







The Value of College Visits



- Help determine if it's the right place for you
- Connect with interesting and helpful people
- Show demonstrated interest
- See how you relate to campus and students
- Help answer why you want to attend
- Identify type/location of school
 - Large, medium, small
 - Private, public, liberal arts, etc.
 - Urban, suburban, rural

Preparation is Key

Do your homework

- Have background knowledge before visiting
- Website, publications, blogs, social media
- Prepare questions

Schedule your visit – no more than 2/day

- At least two weeks in advance
- Try to visit while in session
- Fall break and spring break

Know your Regional Admissions Rep

- Name
- E-mail
- This is who will first review your application

The Visit

Dress appropriately

- Only one first impression
- Wear comfortable shoes
- Plan for weather umbrella, jacket

Be on time

- Plan for parking and traffic
- Anticipate an extra 10 minutes from parking to appointment



The Visit

- Be attentive and interact with those you meet
- Take pictures and notes
 - The schools will begin to blur together
 - Keep records on every visit
 - Makes writing thank you notes easier
- Talk to students
 - Tour guides are paid to help sell the school
 - Ask open ended questions
- Observe how students interact with one another
- Look at the student newspaper

- Virtual Tours Unigo
- Chat with current students or admission reps online
- Follow schools on social media platforms
- Attend College Fairs
- Attend local information sessions

- Get to know our Career Center Specialist & your Counselor
- Check the calendar regularly
- Let Counselors know you are interested
- Attend the visits
- Be prepared with questions
- Introduce yourself after the presentation
- Follow-up with a thank you e-mail or handwritten note

Both Predict College Readiness

- Many universities accept both tests.
- Many students achieve different results on the SAT vs. the ACT
- Princeton Review and Kaplan offer "free" SAT tests
 - Self-proctor your own practice
 - Stick to time limits
- Focus on the one you score best
- ACT given to all PUSD juniors in April of 2023
- Free ACT Tests Available at ACT.org







Teacher/Counselor will write a recommendation based on interactions with the student


Complete Student Profile Sheet for Letters Of Recommendation

SAI (Standard Aid Index)

- What is an SAI?
 - The amount the federal government believes you can contribute to your child's education
 - Determines need-based federal student aid
