



Centennial High School is a testing location for the SAT. You must first begin by going to the College Board website and creating an account. When you register online for an exam, you have the ability to choose our site to test. The following information you can use in your planning for spring of your Junior year.

Exam Fees

- **Subject Test - \$26** to register, plus \$22 for each additional test



Subject Tests are in the areas of Literature, U.S. History, Mathematics Level I, Mathematics Level 2, Biology E/M, Chemistry, Physics, French, and Spanish. Students choose to take a Subject Tests to stand out in college admissions. While colleges don't require them, they do use them for admission to get a more complete picture of applicants. This is an opportunity to show your strength as a student to colleges.

Fee waivers are available through your School Counselor and the Guidance Office– you must be eligible for free/reduced lunch through the National Student Lunch Program. A fee waiver allows you to take the exam for free. You are allowed up to 2. If you are eligible for and use a *fee waiver*, the College Board will also give you up to 4 application fee waivers to college. Applying to college is an expensive process, with fees ranging from \$25 to \$100 per application (depending on the school).

Test Prep Opportunities

- **Apps** – download on your Smart Phone (some are free, others have a fee)
- **Paper/Book** – Look for books for the NEW SAT 2016+ through Amazon, Barnes & Noble, etc.
- **Khan Academy** - go to www.khanacademy.org to create a study plan and take full length practice tests to see what your skills are, how you can improve, and improve your test taking abilities. Link your PSAT results to Khan Academy.
- **Test Prep Organizations (online or in person tutoring)**– Princeton Review offers test prep courses and classes, Sylvan Learning Center, etc.
- **Study Groups** – you form them with your friends, determine what you want to study and help each other solve problems
