AP Seminar Objectives:

- World History with a focus to study political, economic, and social/cultural history. (1450 ____)
- English II with a focus on literary analysis and writing structure.
- Argument Analysis
 - o Identify an author's line of reasoning, claim, and structure
 - o Analyze the effectiveness of author's claims, evidence, and reasoning
- Argumentation
 - o Create an argument through the themes represented in four source documents
- Team Research and Presentation 20% of AP score
 - o Individual research compiled to formulate a research proposal
 - o Research compiled into an argument
 - Argument compiled into a team presentation
- Individual Research project 35% of AP score
 - o Individual research compiled to formulate an argument
 - Argument compiled into an individual presentation

AP Seminar exam:	
Short Answer Analysis of Argument	Construct an evidence based argument
 30 minutes for 3 short answer questions 	 60 minutes for 1 argument essay

Why take the test?

- ASU 3 credits for a score of >3 which counts for elective credit
 - \$142 test = (\$358 per credit X 3) = \$1,074
- NAU 3 credits for a score of >3 which counts for elective credit
 - \$142 test = (\$224 per credit X 3) = \$672
- UofA 3 credits for a score of >3 which counts for elective credit
 - \$142 test = (\$733 per credit X 3) = \$2,199
- Most California Colleges and Universities offer at least 3 credits for a score of >3, but per credit prices vary

Even if a student were to *fail*, **85% of colleges** would rather see you tried and took the risk than taking an AP course and not test.
