AP Exam Registration Updates

Our AP Exam registration dates have been extended. We have an AP night planned for students and parents and we want to give everyone time after AP night to decide about AP exam registration. Please see the new deadline dates below:

AP Parent Night: October 6th in the Auditorium 6-7pm. More info will be coming on this event.

AP Test Registration: Now-October 12th you need to do two things

-Indicate on the College Board Website whether or not you will be testing for each AP class you are taking this fall.

-If you will be testing, fill out the form found here: <u>www.tinyurl.com/xaysmsfv</u> You will fill this out only once, even if you are taking more than one test.

AP Test Payment: October 16-November 5th. You will be able to see your fees on the InTouch system or at the bookstore. You will not have fees added to your account before October 16th so you will not be able to pay before that.

-You need to pay your AP exam fees either through the bookstore, tax credit, or via the online InTouch system.

Also, <u>the state of Arizona will be paying the remaining balance for any student who qualifies for the College</u> <u>Board Fee Reduction</u>. Normally the College Board Fee Reduction brings the cost down, but now that cost will be completely paid for, and these students will take their tests for free.

As a reminder, students who are either enrolled in or eligible to participate in the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) qualify for the AP Exam fee reduction on all AP Exams that they take in a given year. Students are eligible for free or reduced-price meals if:

- their family's annual income falls within the Income Eligibility Guidelines set by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Food and Nutrition Service (please see the chart below), or
- the students are categorically eligible to be directly certified without application for free school meals because they are:
 - in households participating in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), or in some states, Medicaid benefits, or
 - homeless, migrant, runaway, or in foster care, or
 - enrolled in a federally funded Head Start Program

USDA Food and Nutrition Service Income Eligibility Guidelines for 2021-22

The following table lists annual family incomes by family size, at 185% of the poverty level. If the student's annual family income falls within the amount listed in the relevant row and column, that student qualifies for an AP Exam fee reduction.
