## TLC Classes Use Technology to Focus on Life and Careers

The Technology, Life and Career (TLC) classes will continue its focus on a variety of life skills and careers. During the next two months, both 7th and grade students will study personal finance including how to develop a budget, balance a checkbook, and finance a car.

Eighth grade students will also learn about public safety (including law enforcement and military careers) and education (including developing a lesson, teaching a class, and assessing what was learned).

Seventh grade students will also learn about video editing and production (using Movie Maker software to create a movie trailer) and marketing and promotions (including a Shark-Tank style presentation for a new product or service, development of a multi-media advertising campaign, and creating a website page).

TLC is providing our students with knowledge about technology, life and a variety of careers!

## Parents, this policy has been in effect since August, 2015

**Help your student be responsible and successful!**

The School Office **will only accept the following items** when being dropped off:  
**Eyeglasses, medications, lunch money, lunches, and house keys.**

The student will be called only if they are NOT expecting the drop off. Otherwise, your child is responsible for checking in the office for their dropped items.

This policy went into effect due to the overwhelming number of items dropped off in previous years in the School Office, and because students were texting parents to drop off requested items. A student caught texting will result in their phone being taken away and logged as 1st, 2nd or 3rd offense.

Responsibility is a very important skill for all students to accept and to practice. To help our students learn responsibility we do not allow items such as projects, homework, clothes, shoes, backpacks, library books, etc. to be dropped off for delivery to students.
